

THE BLACK BOX TREASURES (#40)

There is an interesting term called the "black box theory". It speaks about an object which can be analyzed in terms of its input and output, but there is no knowledge of its internal workings. Many of us probably don't know that in our Archives here in Rome we have more than 200 black boxes. Some of those treasures have seen the light of day in many publications, but there are still others waiting to been seen...

(Letters from Quarantine #40)

Many of us have been cooped up in rectories or religious houses for some time now. Indeed,

some are even in self quarantine. Self quarantine or imposed quarantine does not come easy for most. Reading the letters of our Founders, we can find notes about the times when they also were held in quarantine.

We learn for example that 1866 was quite difficult for our Fathers because of the so called *fourth cholera pandemic* (1863-1875). The pandemic began in the Ganges Delta, reached Europe in 1865/1866 and claimed 600,000 lives around the world. Many were infected and even as many as half died from severe vomiting, diarrhea and painful cramps.

When Fr. Jerome Kajsiewicz, C.R. was returning from Brazil in August of 1866 after finishing his general visitation, he was stopped in Hyeres, France. He spent two weeks there because of quarantine and when he finally arrived in Port Civitavecchia near Rome he was detained another week.

Today I would like to share with you some of his letters about being in quarantine....

1. (to Fr. Valerian Kalinka, C.R. - ACRR 6765)

Hyeres, August 4, 1866

JMJ - God's will

My Dear Valery!

I just now received your letter with a cheque. God bless you. I took some medicine today. The doctor advised me to still wait a few days before resuming my journey. Meanwhile, cholera decreases in Marseilles, maybe God will give me an opportunity to return by sea and avoid the Italian pandemonium [chaos]. Maybe in the meantime they will find my suitcase that was lost. May God be with us...

2. (to Fr. Alexander Jelowicki, C.R. - ACRR 6766)

Hyeres, August 6, 1866

JMJ - God's will

My Dear Father Alexander!

I've been held here, and not because I like it, but probably it is God's providence. My stomach is causing me trouble so the doctor gave me aperient. If I were to go straight to Rome without resting here, I could get something longer lasting and more serious [...] But now what to do? I have 1,000 francs cash and a 3,000 in cheque. I don't want to travel by land... I could take a stagecoach to Genoa and there board a ship which departs every fifth day. But even so I will have to spend 5 days of quarantine before boarding. But will it free me from 15-days' quarantine in Civitavecchia near Rome? It will also be expensive just sitting here for two weeks with this bad air and being uncomfortable and without the possibility of attending a retreat and Holy Mass. I also wrote a letter requesting more information about a schedule of direct sailing to Civitavecchia. Maybe I could risk being in quarantine for some days and then maybe my Roman friends will help me get out after a few days...

3. (to Fr. Peter Semenenko, C.R. - ACRR 6768)

Toulon, August 15, 1866

JMJ - God's will

My Dear Father Peter,

I don't understand why it is happening, but clearly God is delaying my return to Rome. Yesterday I left Hyeres (France) against the advice of Mr. Dariusz and despite having had a restless night's sleep. I stayed in Toulon for a few hours to visit Fr. Szelechowski and then I decided to go to Marseille for the night. But after dinner, I had indigestion (even though I had eaten just a little bit). I was tired, sweating, and had diarrhea. I decided to spend the night and leave after Mass today. That night the problems continued. I had diarrhea, my tongue was white, my pulse was irregular. Not wanting to get sick at the hotel or on the ship, I decided to go back to Hyeres for a week. In event of becoming more ill. I would have all the help for free. I hope to arrive next week, and then I hope to avoid quarantine. The authorities stopped hanging posters about cholera - they may not be telling the whole truth maybe for business reasons, but it is certain that cholera has been lessening. I will write to the Roman Consul tomorrow to ask his advice since the quarantine depends on me departure. If he tells me that there might still be quarantine and disinfection happening in a week, I will not bring the boxes with liturgical vestments and fruit preserves, because everything will smell of smoke from disinfection [...]

God bless you and may we see each other soon.

Civitavecchia, August 29, 1866

Dear Brother in the Lord!

[..] This is now the fourth day in quarantine. I could celebrate Holy Mass for three days now and I know that the guard gave evidence that we are all perfectly well. I hope it will only entail eight days. God be with you all...

Civitavecchia, September 5, 1866

My dear Brother!

I am still writing from quarantine - it could not be shortened, but I hope that God will let me go to Rome at eight in the morning. Yesterday, Vatera's ship came with seriously ill people and some deceased...The ship wanted to dock at the port, but it was pushed away, they couldn't even unload the goods ashore! [...]
